'Journey on a River' art workshop raises £350

On 4th September 2021 we held our second on-line arts workshop based on the theme "Journey on a River". We were pleased to be joined by supporters from around the world including children from both the Peace Home and the Sadarghat launch terminal transitional shelter near the river, in Dhaka.

The workshop was part of Totally Thames 2021 a London-based river festival, with support from the environmental charity Thames 21. The online workshop started with a live connection to the LEEDO team at the Buriganga river in Dhaka and a discussion with children who live at the river port.

Participants were then provided with guidance about drawing a river scene and shared their memories of river journeys.

The LEEDO Street Child Football Girls' Team has been selected

A team of girls will take part in Doha 2022

The LEEDO team for the Street Child Football World Cup that is being held in Doha from 3rd to 15th October has now been selected. They are practicing every morning with help from 2 volunteers from Germany and trainers from Sports for Hope and Independence Bangladesh. 10 girls aged 13-17 will go to Doha along with 3 team leaders. The other girls' teams will be from Brazil, Bolivia, Darfur, India, Indonesia, Mexico, Palestine, Peru, Philippines, USA, and Zimbabwe. Along with the tournament for girls there will be a boys' tournament too with teams from Burundi, England, Hungary, Mauritius, Nepal, Pakistan, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zaatari.

The tournament will be a unique opportunity for the children from LEEDO to meet children from all over the world. Apart from the football the event will include a child-focused Congress and General Assembly where the children will speak about their rights and protection including the importance of access to education.

For LEEDO this is the second time that a team has participated in an international children's sports tournament. It follows the success of LEEDO's involvement in the Street Child Cricket World Cup held in England in 2019.

Through this tournament LEEDO was able to





raise its profile and increase support for children surviving on the streets of Dhaka. It is hoped that the 2022 tournament can build on this success.

If you, or anybody you know, is interested in supporting the team financially please get in touch with us. Support has already been received from the University of West England, the main sponsor of the team in 2019, and from the Growing Up Club in Dhaka who have provided the team with practice kits and equipment.

We will be following the team using our face book page whilst they are in Doha and will also organise support events in the UK and online.

News from the open-air school that we support in Dhaka

On 10th October our Chairperson, Mike Sherriff, was pleased to visit the open-air school we support at Rayer Bazar next to the Martyred Intellectuals Memorial in Dhaka. 25 students regularly attend the school. Most of the children are from families who quite recently moved to Dhaka from the remote areas of Bangladesh and who now live in the shanty towns near the memorial.

The school recruit the children from the street, where they meet. The aim is that after a year they should get admission to a government school or madrassa. There were 2 groups of children – one for the older age group and one for the younger children. Nizam, one of the young people who took part in the Street Child Cricket tournament in London in 2019, is one of the teachers at the school. He showed Mike the curriculum which has a mix of formal learning in Maths, Bangla, and English and human values education. During the visit there was a discussion with the children about the environment including the effect of rubbish on water and how pollution limits the opportunities for children to learn to swim.

Children at the station our theme for fundraising in 2022

A lot of the work undertaken by LEEDO is with children who arrive in Dhaka by train. LEEDO meet many children at the station, and with the children's agreement, some go to the transitional shelter where arrangements are made to rehabilitate them with their families or alternative long-term care arrangements are made with non-Government organisations, including long term care at the Peace Home run by LEEDO. An open- air school is also held at the station and food distributed to the children on 4 days a week. The school is mainly attended by older children who sleep at the station and who also work there – for example carrying luggage and working at tea stalls.

Mike went to the station and met with LEEDO's social mobiliser who had just found a 9 year old boy who had come from Jessore in the South West of Bangladesh by train. He had been surviving on the street for about two days. The social mobiliser took the boy to the railway station police office where there is a welfare desk for children. A form was filed to confirm the name of the child, where he was from and that he was being cared for by LEEDO. This helps with tracing family members. The police have been working with LEEDO in this way for many years and know the LEEDO staff.

The boy went by rickshaw with the social mobiliser to the nearby shelter run by LEEDO. There are 10-12 children there at any one time aged from as young as 5 to 11. They are mainly boys but also some girls. There is a carer and a cook who stay at the shelter with the children and a child volunteer from Peace Home who helps regularly. The children sleep in small dormitories with separate rooms for boys and girls. The shelter is at the top of a block of offices.

Friends of Street Children Bangladesh plan to focus our fundraising in 2022 on the theme of children at the station. We hope to have another art workshop. We are planning a sleep-out at the station in Dhaka with LEEDO, following the successful sleep out by the Executive Director of LEEDO when he visited the UK in 2018. The sleep out will be shared on facebook live and we will be asking our supporters to join in by sleeping outside at their home and/or joining us on-line. We also hope that any supporters with a train set from their child hood will consider auctioning it to raise money for Friends of Street Children Bangladesh.
