Our next fundraising meal including a film screening is being held in Brick Lane's Banglatown on Sunday 18 December at 1pm.




Image (above): FSCBD film screening of "Clay Bird" at the Monsoon Restaurant on Brick Lane

Football in Doha 2022 and Cricket in Delhi 2023

From 7th to 16th October 2022 a team of girls from the LEEDO Peace Home took part in the Street Child United Street Football Child World Cup 2022 in Doha. 10 girls and 3 leaders travelled to Doha. One of the leaders was one of the young women who took part as a player in the Street Child Cricket World Cup in London in 2019.

Friends of Street Children Bangladesh supported the team. We helped with finding sponsors including The University of West England, London College of Legal Studies (Dhaka South), and US Bangla Airlines who provided free airline tickets for the team. Prior to departure the British High Commission in Dhaka organised a farewell programme for the team. It included drama from the children, songs, a film that has been produced about the work of LEEDO, and a video with the Band Blue Jeans with their song written especially for the team - "We can also". Friends of Street Children Bangladesh organised zoom calls with the team and supporters from several countries including the UK prior to the teams' departure, during the tournament and after their return. Our thanks to everyone who sponsored and supported the team of girls from Bangladesh.

During the tournament the Bangladesh team played teams of girls from Mexico, Zimbabwe, Peru, India, and the USA. The girls' tournament was eventually won by Brazil and Mexico won the boys' tournament.





It was a great experience for the girls from Bangladesh to meet young people from many different countries who have survived on the streets, and to promote their message that children who are on the street should receive birth certificates and proper recognition as citizens of their country. During the tournament there was a cultural programme including dances and songs from the Bangladesh team and one of the girls in the team featured in a TV programme produced by the international channel Al Jazeera. In September 2023 Street Child United will again be organising a Street Child Cricket World Cup. This will be held in Delhi, with the earlier rounds in cities in other parts of India. A team from LEEDO will again be taking part. It is possible that some supporters from the UK may also join them. If you would be interested, then please let us know. Friends of Street Children Bangladesh will again be helping with fundraising and sponsorship for the team.

What happens to the children when they move on from the school we support on the streets of Dhaka?

The street school at Rayer Bazar in Dhaka has been supported by Friends of Street Children Bangladesh for several years. Twenty-five children (seven boys and eighteen girls) currently attend the school five days a week.

There are two teachers, one of whom used to live at LEEDO's Peace Home and came to London as one of the LEEDO players in the Street Child Cricket World Cup 2019.

Last year seventeen children from the street school were admitted to local primary schools, mainly the local Government School, to continue their education. I spoke to two children who previously attended the Rayer Bazar School.

Johir is 15 years old. He goes to school for 4 hours per day and works as a plumber for 5 hours per day. He started going to school after attending the Rayer Bazar street school. He has 3 older brothers who did not go to school.

Johir learnt a lot from the street school run by LEEDO including reading, writing and maths.

Mim is 15 years old. She attends a Government Primary School and is in Class 8. She was admitted to class one from the LEEDO street school. LEEDO's child sponsorship programme provides her with educational support.

Mim learnt a lot at the LEEDO street school. She wants to work for children in future and volunteer with LEEDO.

A new initiative aiming to provide paid internships for young people from LEEDO's Peace Home

For some time, Friends of Street Children Bangladesh has been contacting people we know in Bangladesh and asking them to provide information and advice to young people at LEEDO's Peace Home who are interested in pursuing specific careers. We have run on-line sessions on becoming an artist, studying social work, and studying medicine. We were especially pleased when a young dentist who had organised dental health camps at LEEDO whilst a student approached us and proposed offering paid internships to 2 young people from LEEDO at his newly opened dental surgery located close to the LEEDO Peace Home.

Kashem, who lives at the Peace Home has now been an intern at the dental surgery for more than 3 months. He was born near Chittagong but came to Dhaka when he was about five years old. He spent much of his childhood at different stations and survived by begging and collecting and selling water bottles. He often stayed at shelters in Dhaka that gave him food and somewhere to sleep but did not arrange any education. Five years ago, he was admitted to LEEDO's Peace Home and started to attend school. At first, he struggled with the lessons but eventually he was one of the students achieving the highest marks in class exams. In 2019 he was one of the boys selected to come to London to take part in the Street Child Cricket World Cup.

After studying during the day Kashem now cycles to the dental chamber in Mohammadpur where he works in the evening as a receptionist. He has also started to assist the dentist who is seeing patients. LEEDO have helped him to open a bank account and he is earning money that he will be able to use to help him with his education and to ensure that he has a better future when he is too old to continue living at Peace Home.

We are now hoping that other businesses will make a commitment to recruit young people who have stayed at Peace Home, ensuring that they do not have to return to a life surviving on the streets.





New children's book

The Street is Not a Home is a book for children and about children. It has been written by Mike Sherriff, and illustrated by Saif Osmani, both trustees of Friends of Street Children, Bangladesh. It is for children aged nine plus and about children who have survived on the streets of Dhaka.

A unique feature of the book is that it was written and illustrated with the children. Eighteen children told their stories to Mike who then created four fictional characters. Children from LEEDO's projects then provided feedback and made suggestions after discussing the draft stories. Saif used materials from online art workshops and some drawings produced by the children when creating the illustrations.

The book is being published using bi-lingual text for children of Bangladeshi heritage. It introduces children to Bangladesh through the experiences of children who have survived on the streets. It aims to portray children not as they are frequently portrayed by charities as only victims or heroes, but as children with hopes and fears that are like those of all children. The author and illustrator are not taking royalties from the sale of the book and the publisher is not making a profit. After covering publication costs all funds from selling the book will be donated to Friends of Street Children Bangladesh to pay for work with children on the streets of Dhaka.
