This is where most of the children from different parts of Bangladesh arrive when they first come to the capital city. The outreach team from LEEDO are very active finding the new arrivals and encouraging them to take a place at the LEEDO transitional shelter. If possible, children are re-united with their families. For those children who sleep at the station there is an open-air school and training in skills including sewing and mobile phone servicing.

FILMS RAISE FUNDS AND AWARENESS



To raise funds to support the work of LEEDO in Dhaka and to raise awareness about the situation facing street connected children we have arranged two successful and well- attended programmes where we have shown recently produced films on-line.

The first was in February where we showed the film "Green Foot Soldiers" This powerful documentary highlights the incredible life challenges and environmental remarkable contributions of street-connected children known as "Tokai" (waste collectors). The film follows their daily lives and reveals the hazardous conditions they face from an early age, It is a story rarely told.

Filmmaker Dr. Hasan Reza, an Associate Professor at Indiana University School of Social Work (IUSSW) in the USA joined us for discussion after the film. The trailer for the film can be viewed online at:


INTRODUCING YOUNG
PEOPLE PARTICIPATING
IN THE SKILLS TRAINING
PROJECT NEAR THE
RAILWAY STATION

At Kamlapur railway station in Dhaka are children who have been staying there for many months. Some have been there for several years and are not interested in staying at shelters provided by government or nongovernment organisations. Some have previously used these facilities and had a bad experience. A pilot initiative by LEEDO has been providing training for older children, some of whom are staving at the shelter and some who visit the centre daily from the station. The aim of the training is to teach skills that the children can use to earn money. The training includes tailoring and

mobile phone repair. It happens on 5 days per week with 2 teachers - one for sewing and one for mobile repair. The courses are 6 months in length.

One boy receiving training is 14 years old. He was born in Rangpur District (in the Northwest of Bangladesh). He has been in Dhaka for more than 3 years. He came to Dhaka alone by train. He has one sister in Rangpur who studies in a Madrassa. He had arguments with his parents and left them because they thought he was a burden. His father died two years ago. He studied to class 4 in Rangour then came to Dhaka. At first. he was at Tongi station in Dhaka and stayed at a night shelter run by a private organisation. He was there for 6 months. He then stayed in shelters run by various organisations and travelled alone to over 14 districts in Bangladesh on the roof of trains.

He is now learning mobile servicing. He has wanted to do this since he was young. He has been doing the course for 4 months and has another two months before completion. Eventually he wants to work in a shop. He hopes to find a good job.

One girl taking part in the sewing training is 16 years old. She has been staying at the shelter near the station for about one year.

She has no mother and father and has stayed on the street at the station and at the ferry terminal in Dhaka.

She likes the games, studying, and food at the shelter. She enjoys learning sewing and in future wants to work in a garments factory but has not yet found one that will recruit her.

Another boy receiving training is 16 years old. He has been staying at Kamlapur Railway station for seven years and from where he previously attended a madrassa and studied to class 5. He once tried to go to India, but the police would not let him cross the border. At the station he sleeps on the roof with his friends. He does not want to stay there in winter because it is too cold.

As a child he was fascinated by switches and light and so joined the LEEDO electrical training course.

He now wants to work in a shop. He is going from shop to shop to try to find work and if he does so will then try to find his own place to live. 66

This year we sent four grants to LEEDO totalling £15,551. The grants were for continuation of the work of Rayer Bazar school with children living in the nearby slums, continuation of work with children at the Dhaka railway station, a project to provide food, medicine and training for children with funds raised by NgO3 and a project supported and funded by Street Child United following LEEDO's participation in the Street Child Cricket World Cup 2023.

This year we also successfully bid to run a workshop as part of the Newham Festival of stories. This was based on our book "The Street is Not a Home"" and all participants received a copy of this bilingual book. This type of event helps to raise awareness about the situation facing street connected children, which is one of our aims

During the year we raised £3,800 from fundraising events and donations, including screening of two films (one online and one in- person event), a fundraising meal and a zoom meeting with supporters and children from projects run by LEEDO.

We successfully applied for two small grants from charitable Trusts to support aspects of LEEDOs work at the railway station in Dhaka.

This year we upgraded our web site and increased the number of people making regular donations to support our work using the People's Fundraising on-line giving platform.

During the year we recruited one new trustee, and we are keen to recruit more trustees so please get in touch if you are interested in joining us in this important role.

This year our total income was £13,615 and our expenditure was £15,766. We spent more than our income this year as we used some of the reserves accumulated from previous years to send more money to LEEDO, especially for their work at the station, where the need is urgent and there are very limited funds available from other sources.

RAYER BAZAR SCHOOL START USING NEW GAMES TO TEACH THE CHILDREN

Friends of Street Children Bangladesh has been sending funds to support Raver Bazar School the Mohammadpur, Dhaka, for over five years. The school helps children, most of whom recently arrived in Dhaka more remote parts of Bangladesh and who live in slum housing in the area. The children do not attend the schools in the area and many work to earn some money for their families. This street school run by LEEDO helps to ensure that they can develop the skills to read and write. It also supports the children to get entry to local primary schools. One of the teachers is a former beneficiary and as a youngster lived at the LEEDO Peace Home.

In 2024 LEEDO started to work with the Swiss organisation Pernova to

introduce educational games into the curriculum at all their schools. Staff were trained in using the new approach at a residential training camp. The games are based on the "KRAFT" model using sport and play to teach social values and life skills that promote personal development and physical and mental well-being.

KRAFT stands for K- Body; R- Rules; A-Acceptance; F - Fairness; and T- Team. After each game there are discussions with the children covering social issues and conflicts relevant to their lives.

At Rayer Bazar school I observed one of the games being used to develop teamwork. Two groups formed a circle and then every child in the circles was given a piece of paper with a word such as dance, song, smile and angry. They then had to do a performance based on the words they were given. This was followed with discussion about what the children liked and disliked about the experience.

SLEEP OUT AT THE FERRY TERMINAL IN DHAKA

In the past the Executive Director of LEEDO, Forhad Hossain, and the Chair of Friends of Street Children Bangladesh, Mike Sherriff, have both taken part in "sleep outs" to raise funds to support the work of LEEDO. Forhad first slept out at Lords Cricket Ground in a programme organised with the charity Street Child United. Forhad. Mike and supporters of LEEDO then slept out at the station in Dhaka. This was a great opportunity to have discussions with the children who sleep there every night.

This year our plan is to sleep out again to raise money to support the work of LEEDO. We aim to do this at the end of the year and this time our plan is to join the children at the ferry terminal in Dhaka. We hope that others in Bangladesh might join us and that supporters in the UK might consider having their own sleep out to raise funds.
